C. Legislation Committee Report

John MacIntosh

John MacIntosh presented an overview of the role he plays as NHBA Legislative Representative. John reported that over 1,000 bills are introduced each year and that the NHBA Legislation Committee reviews bills identified as possibly:

- of significant interest to lawyers AND
- pertaining to the administration of justice OR
- the composition and operation of the courts OR
- the practice of law and the legal profession

As of January 19, the NHBA Legislation Committee has reviewed 90 bills, with 30-40 more to go; John explained the recommendations the NHBA Legislation Committee makes to the Board of Governors.

Due to legislation hearing dates that were scheduled to take place prior to the Jan. 19 Board meeting, Bar President Jennifer Parent gave John authority to take the following actions on pending bills, as the Legislation Committee recommended at their December 19, 2011, January 3, 2012 and January 17, 2012 meetings. The Board was asked to consider ratifying those positions.

- I. Appointment of Bruce Felmly to Rule 170 Subcommittee Jennifer Parent

The **Board approved the appointment** of Bruce Felmly, Manchester to the Rule 170 Subcommittee of the Court Rules Committee.

- J. Public Protection Fund (PPF) Committee Report Kevin Collimore

Before giving his report, Kevin Collimore, chair of the Public Protection Fund, received a special BOG commendation on behalf of Roland Morneau, a longtime PPF Committee member who is stepping down from service. Attorney Morneau was unable to attend the meeting and personally receive the plaque which acknowledged his 15 years of services first with the Client Indemnity Fund Committee and then the PPF Committee.

Kevin then presented the Committee's Annual Report, as filed with the Supreme Court in accordance with Rule 55, which included an overview of the committee's purpose and the past year's work. The past year was dominated by clients of disbarred Attorney Brian McCaffrey, who collected flat fees from hundreds of clients to file bankruptcy petitions for which he did little or no work. The PPF, under a recent amendment to the rule, created an expedited "small claims" process for qualified losses under \$2,500. Processing these claims was a major activity for the PPF Committee and its staff liaison, NHBA Director of Finance Paula Lewis and Finance Department Assistant Lisha Brosseau. Attorney Philip Pettis of Portsmouth was appointed by the Supreme Court to handle the respondent attorney's files, and to identify and assist clients. Pettis and members of the PPF also helped find attorneys who volunteered or worked at reduced fees to assist some of the wronged clients in filing their delayed bankruptcies.

- K. Rule 170 Mediation Program Update Laurie Levin

Laurie Levin, the recently appointed coordinator of dispute resolution programs for the judicial branch, reported that a review of dispute resolutions initiatives is underway. There was discussion on the decline in Rule 170 attorney participation since the program changed from volunteer to a mix of volunteer and paid mediation. Levin would like to see more dispute resolution options and feels that for the dispute resolution program to work, mediation training needs to be mandated. Levin informed the Board that in the spring an abuse and neglect pilot project will be started in Rochester, and that a grant to DHHS will increase services for indigent families in the next month. Levin reported that the Rule 170 study group, to which the Board has appointed Bruce Felmly, will be making suggestions to the Court before the changes to Rule 170 are made permanent. Discussion ended with Levin hoping to see more collaboration between the court, law school and the Bar.

- L. NHBA support for wireless access in State Courthouses Derek Lick

Derek had nothing new to report other than more work is needed and the process is more complicated than thought. Derek will report to the BOG at the March meeting.

M. President's Report, including Jennifer Parent

Mid-Winter Meeting – 3/7/12 – The meeting brochure was distributed and Jennifer pointed out that great pricing is once again being applied, in part through a subsidy from the NHMCLE Board (from a surplus created through late fees paid by attorneys not in compliance with Supreme Court Rule 53).

Award nominations for awards to be presented at the meeting will be reviewed and recipients will be identified shortly.

St. Anselm to Host Northeast Regional Mock Trial Tournament being held 2/17 – 2/19/2012; judges are needed (a link for interested volunteers to be forwarded to BOG).

N. PCC Issues Regarding when Orders are Posted on Public Website Jaye Rancourt

Jaye reported that on 1/17/12 the PCC approved the ADO's request to post PCC Orders on the ADO web-site prior to the Orders becoming "Final". In other words, the ADO will post orders of the PCC upon the orders being issued and will not wait for the time period to expire for Motions to Reconsider to be filed and/or for appeals to the New Hampshire Supreme Court to be concluded. Orders will be posted with a notice that the order is subject to a Motion to Reconsider. If a Motion to Reconsider is filed, that Motion and the Objection will be posted on the web-site. Once an order issues on that Motion it will be posted with notification that the Order is subject to appeal. If an appeal is taken, the notice of appeal shall be posted as well.

Several PCC members expressed concern, but the "posting plan" had been adopted. Jaye brought to the attention of the PCC that some members of the bar believed the proposed change was subject to review through the Court's formal rule making process

Jaye informed the BOG that the PCC was going to notify the NH Supreme Court of their intention to post these orders by letter, and plans that if the NH Supreme Court does not object, the new process would be put in place April 1, 2012.

ACTION

It was recommended that a letter be sent from the Association asking the Court to submit this proposal to the Court Rules Committee.

NOTE: Derek Lick and Judith Homan abstained from this recommendation.

O. Executive Director's Report, including Jeannine McCoy

e-Court Update: Jeannine McCoy provided an update on the NH e-Court Public Forum meeting she attended earlier today. A master plan laying out key decisions for implementation is still being drafted and will be released soon, but e-Court project manager Peter Caradonna relayed a number of key decisions made by the Supreme Court (the project team had solicited input at a November public forum on these issues).

- **Transaction fees will be charged** for e-filing. There will be exceptions for indigents and fees will not be charged to government entities such as the police. In other jurisdictions, such fees range from \$3 to \$12 with \$5 being the median, Caradonna said.

- **Use of e-Court services will be mandatory.** Participation will be voluntary during a trial period. Pro se litigants and others may be able to electronically file at kiosks set up in courthouses.
- **Court system will control the system with “tight” control of vendors** providing equipment and services. Some systems, such as the IRS e-filing for tax returns, allow multiple vendors to offer filing and other services. The Judicial Branch decided it will be the owner of the system, with vendors providing services to it.
- **Cloud storage.** The e-Court project would be too limited if case files were maintained in servers physically located in specific courthouses. Although changes in laws may be required, secure storage “in the cloud” will be used.
- **Implementation by court levels** rather than case types. E-Court systems can initially be implemented more rapidly by types of cases, but the developers believe it will be more efficient to implement an entire court rather than piecemeal.
- **“Ingesting” or adding back cases into the electronic system will depend** on the type and duration of cases. For example, motor vehicle cases, typically very short-lived, will not be “ingested” while family law and document-intensive civil cases will be.

Peter Cardonna said that the superior court will be the first court level to convert to nearly paperless operation, with a projected launch of a pilot project in April 2013.

The project sequence calls for testing and rollout at all the superior court sites through 2013; the District Division of the Circuit Court comes next in 2014; then Family and Probate divisions in 2015; and the Supreme Court rollout completes the project in 2016.

Bar Activity Update: the “You Should Know” report will be emailed to the Board. Some highlights include:

- The ABA has acknowledged and praised the Bar’s LRS Facebook fan page as an example other programs around the country should model and link to.
- Jocelyn Champagne is leaving the NH Bar for a new job as the NH Taxpayer Advocate for the IRS
- Hillsborough North Attorney Security ID Access program is up and running
- Due to changes made to manage the NHMCLE Rule as a service, only 12 attorney names had to be sent to the court for non-compliance with Rule 53 requirements.
- To date more than seventy-five law students signed up for the Bar’s Law Student Advantage Program and are now part of the Bar’s Law Student Section Subscription program. The UNH School of Law is paying the fee of \$50 for their students, which is being donated to the ProBono program.
